ERIN DAVIS-HEINEKING SWOOPS IN FOR \$137,000 ADEQUAN® GRAND PRIX CSI3* VICTORY

Erin Davis-Heineking (USA) is making the most of her two-week visit to the 2020 Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF) with a win in the \$137,000 Adequan® Grand Prix CSI3* during "Saturday Night Lights" of week three at the Palm Beach International Equestrian Center in Wellington, FL, on Saturday, January

Davis-Heineking rode Leonie to thrill Saturday night's crowd by leading the grand prix from start to finish after posting the first clear round over Kelvin Bywater's (GBR) opening track. She again returned first over the short course and set the pace fault free in a quick 45.51 seconds. At the conclusion of a six-horse jump-off, Davis-Heineking still stood atop the podium, barely inching out Ireland's Shane Sweetnam and Karlin van't Vennehof. They were just fractions off the win in 45.67 seconds.

"I was a little bit in disbelief that I had left a couple of jumps up out there," said Davis-Heineking of her jump-off ride. "It didn't quite go as I planned; I had an idea in my mind of the numbers that I wanted to do, and then right before I went in, my trainer/husband [Christian Heineking] basically said to leave one out from all of those. So, I took a shot at the last line and tried to do the six. I chipped in a seven, and she left it up. I was really proud of her."

Leonie, an 11-year-old Oldenburg

mare (Leo von Faelz x Chacco-Blue) owned by October Hill Farm, Inc., joined Davis-Heineking's string two years ago when she came out of retirement to pilot the mount.

"She was a sale horse of my husband's, and he was trying to get me back in the saddle," she said. "He told me to play around with her at home. I did, and before I knew it, he had talked me into going in a small grand prix close by. I almost won it and got the taste again. Honestly, I never saw myself here two years ago, so it's been quite a ride."

Davis-Heineking competed at WEF in the amateur jumper ranks in her 20s and returned with a bang this week. "I never really imagined that I would win one of these grand prix!"

After finishing the runner-up, Sweetnam is excited about Karlin van't Vennehof's future, saying, "It's her first three-star ever and her first night class ever. She still has a bit of a wavs to go with her rideability, but it's getting better all the time.

'When I walked the course tonight. it looked like a very tough course, but she's a good mare," continued Sweetnam of the 10-year-old Belgianbred mare he owns with Seabrook LLC. "She really gets on with her jump. In the jump-off, maybe I could have been a touch faster, but she did a great job; I'm very happy with her."

U.S. Olympic team silver medalist Kent Farrington rounded out the

Sokolow and her new mount Kindred won the under saddle and received additional first and second place ribbons to claim the championship title.

Kindred is a new ride for Sokolow. who has had the horse for less than a

week. Sokolow went to Ocala last week to try the horse as a prospect for the junior hunter division. It was clear that the pair was right for each other when they won all three classes and were champion in their first show together earlier this season. "We instantly knew that it was the right match!" commented Sokolow.

The eight-year-old gelding was then brought to Wellington, where he showed earlier in the week with Kate Conover. Sokolow, of Westlake Village, CA. then took over the ride on Kindred again and the pair was able to continue their winning streak. "He has such a great personality and the way he goes around the ring is just so pretty," said Sokolow of her new mount.

Reserve champion of the Large Junior 15 and Under went to Augusta Iwasaki of Calabasas, CA, and Lion. Iwasaki and Lion, owned by Davlyn Farms Inc., received two firsts and a seventh place to claim the reserve title.

Week 3 of the Winter Equestrian Festival came to a close with Sterling Malnik and Rockette claiming the Junior Hunter 3'3" 15 and Under championship in the E.R. Mische Grand Hunter Ring. The pair earned two firsts, a second, and a fifth place ribbon.



"This is the biggest class that she's ever jumped, so she was going super high in the first round," he said of the 10-year-old Belgian Warmblood mare. "I was trying to compete in the jump-off going as fast as I thought she'd be comfortable under the lights. Erin had an amazing round. I've known her since I was a kid riding in the Midwest, so I'm really excited to see her here in Wellington and coming out with a big win."

Amanda Derbyshire (GBR) finished fourth riding Cornwall BH for Gochman Sport Horses. They were double-clear in 49.89 seconds, securing Derbyshire the Martha W Jolicoeur Leading Lady Rider Award for week three. Cameron Hanley (IRL) capped the top five on Kasper Van Het Hellehof for owner Poden Farms with the fastest four-fault jump-off round.

Allyn Mann of Adequan®, a colossal supporter of horse sport, was impressed with the level of competition converging in Wellington this weekend that spanned disciplines. "I think what's amazing is this afternoon I was across the street watching some of the top dressage horses in the world compete. Then I hopped in a golf cart and took about a five-minute ride to come here to watch some of the top [show jumping] riders and horses in the country compete.

"This place is electric," he continued. "We're just all really blessed to be part of it."





While still shy of his 30th birthday (which happens during WEF 10), Daniel Bluman has accumulated an impressive list of career highs, including two Olympic Games performances and three FEI World Equestrian Games appearances for his birth country of Colombia and the country he currently represents, Israel. Daniel is a well-known winner at WEF and spends his time in Wellington with his family, including his wife Ariel, an amateur jumper rider, son Avi, and brand-new addition, son Eli.

DO YOU REMEMBER THE FIRST HORSE YOU **RODE? WHAT IS YOUR FONDEST MEMORY AS A KID/JUNIOR?**

I started riding when I was pretty young, so I have a lot of memories with different horses. I definitely remember the first horse who was mine. His name was Tremetal. I was about six or seven when my uncle picked me up from my house and said that we were going to the barn where my older cousins rode. I rode at a different place at the time. He took me where my cousins were riding because that's where the bigger kids rode. He told me, 'Okay, you're going to start riding here because now you're riding this horse who's your older cousin's, but now he's going to you.' That was my first horse. He wasn't really a good horse. He put me in the ground very often! After that, I actually upgraded a few months later to another one. Her name was Alita. She was actually very sweet and nice.

WHAT'S YOUR BIGGEST ACCOMPLISHMENT **IN LIFE SO FAR?**

That's a hard question. I'd say being able to find a balance between having a high-level sport experience while also being able to have a family, which is something I've always dreamed about. I would say that's the thing I'm most proud of: To be able to have a balance between the two.

WHAT SUPERPOWER WOULD YOU LIKE TO HAVE?

I would like to be able to transport myself from one place to another. That definitely would be the most incredible superpower to have. I could be here now, then go home, and then come back tomorrow to show. Same with Europe and everywhere. Not having to go through the airports, airplanes, and traveling. If I could have that superpower, my life would be unreal!

WHAT'S SOMETHING THAT PEOPLE DON'T **KNOW ABOUT YOU?**

I don't think there's anything that hasn't been

I'm not much of a gift person, to tell you the truth. I do other kinds of sweet things, but the whole gift buying and stuff like that has never been my thing. I don't know what to pick!

That's great for me, and it's proven to be a formula that works very well for my sport. I tend to have great WEFs and have had a lot of achievements in Wellington. I think it's greatly due to the fact that I get to settle and be with the family for an extended time.

WEF 4 NEED TO KNOW: FOOTING with Travis Gould of JTWG, Inc.



Before competition began at the Palm Beach International Equestrian Center for the 2020 Winter Equestrian Festival, a major change was made in the International Arena and warm-up ring. Equestrian Sport Productions hired a team of knowledgeable footing professionals to redesign the material and base of the arena to withstand the upcoming competition. One of those footing experts was Travis Gould of JTWG Inc.

Gould has been part of the equestrian industry since he was a child and now works on perfecting arena design and footing. JTWG Inc. provides all equestrian surfaces from mats for placement in stalls or an aisle, to installing and maintaining arenas.

Gould worked closely with a group of other professionals in order to create the perfect surface. The team included David Burton of Equestrian Sport Productions, Bart Poels from Bart Poels Equestrian, and Bill Hawe of iEquitek. "Our main goals were high performance, kindness to the horses, safety, tolerance of extreme weather, and ease of maintenance," described Gould.

The process of redesigning the footing and recreating the base was intricate and detailoriented. Gould explained, "While the footing is what people see, it was really the entire system which needed to be redesigned. This included the base, the sub-base, drainage, [and more].

The team began at the lab, in the hopes of exceeding the performance criteria of other international competition venues. "Our process was that every component that was to be a part of that arena was first tested in the lab, then measured in a test bed, then verified with professional test rides," said Gould. Since their expectations were so high, Gould and the other professionals had to actually invent their own footing. The team created 14 custom footings while searching for the perfect match. They then set up "test pads" for professional riders to use over a period of time to see how the footing held up.

Once the team finalized all the components, the installation process was simple. "When al the materials were in place, it was assembled in rapid fashion," commented Gould.

When creating good footing, Gould believes that it is important to understand what the arena will be used for. "Is it going to be an ultra competition arena like the International [Arena], or a training arena at a small farm? With higher levels of performance come a

higher level of required maintenance and extreme attention to details," he said.

Another factor that Gould believes is important to consider is that footing predictability can be difficult. He noted, "One needs to consider that every arena is different, not just in the goals of the arena, but the materials are quite often different. Many people don't understand this and think that high-quality footing is an off-the-shelf product.

n terms of how often footing should be redone, Gould believes that is dependent on how it was designed initially, what maintenance went into it, and how heavily the arena was used. Measuring and tracking performance and quality is an ongoing process that Gould and the rest of the assembled team are doing in the International Arena. "We will do little things along the way to keep it 'in tune,' rather than wait for a huge crisis and have to replace the entire thing," said Gould.

Overall, Gould is extremely pleased with the feedback he has heard about the footing in the International Arena. "Many of the very top international riders have said this is the first extreme performance arena they have ridden on which is also kind to their horse. The feedback from the riders has been phenomenal!'

U.S. Olympic team gold medalist McLain Ward opened week three at the 2020 Winter Equestrian Festival (WFF) with a win riding Catoki in the \$37,000 Douglas Elliman Real Estate 1.45m CSI3*. With a second and a half to spare, Ward and the 10-year-old Holsteiner gelding (Catoki x Cartello B) bested a field of 48 over Kelvin Bywater's (GBR) two-phase course. Their time was enough to win over runner-up Darragh Kenny (IRL) aboard Billy Dorito, owned by Vlock Show Stables LLC, who posted a time of 31.22 seconds.

Rounding out the podium finishes, Catherine Tyree (USA) finished third riding BEC Lorenzo in 31.81 seconds for owner Mary Tyree. Jessica Springsteen took fourth on Stone Hill Farm's Tiger Lily in 32.54 seconds, while Great Britain's Jessica Mendoza capped the top five riding Dublin, owned by Windsor Farms

Additional International Arena winners on Wednesday included Jessica Mendoza (GBR), who topped the \$6,000 Bainbridge 1.40m CSI3* riding Stella Levista owned by Caroline Mawhinney, and Flore Giraud (FRA),

who claimed the \$6,000 Bainbridge 1.40m riding Voyou du Boboisfor owner Delphine Giraud.

Abigail McArdle and Victorio 5 topped a field of 85 entries to win the \$37,000 Equinimity WEF Challenge Cup Round 3 CSI3* on Thursday. They were one of 11 entries to navigate the first-round course without fault and elect to return to face-off over the short course.

When McArdle returned to the ring, the time to beat had been set at 45.39 seconds by Lucas Porter (USA) and C Hunter, owned by Sleepy P Ranch, but quick foot speed and a skillful slice to one fence in particular would ultimately clinch the victory for McArdle with an unbeatable time of 43.98 seconds. Porter's time held up for second place, while third place with a time of 46.98 seconds went to Jessica Springsteen (USA) and RMF Tinkerbell, owned by Rushy Marsh Farm LLC.

Cameron Hanley (IRL) took fourth aboard Kasper van het Hellehof in 58.10 seconds for owner Poden Farms, while Quentin Judge (USA) capped the top five riding HH Quator, owned by Double H Farm to the fastest four-fault jump-off round.

Another Thursday winner was Tomas Yofre, who rode Jamaica in the \$8,000 Bainbridge 1,45m Jumpers

Ward claimed his second win during week three of the 2020 Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF) in the \$37,000 Bainbridge Companies 1.45m CSI3* aboard Catoki. He and the 10-year-old Holsteiner gelding (Catoki x Cartello B) are a new partnership, but they have wasted no time getting to the winner's circle. The duo topped a field of 59 over Kelvin Bywater's (GBR) speed track by a nearly two-second margin over Mexico's Santiago Lambre and his own Doloris. Ward stopped the clock in 57.54 seconds, while Lambre settled for second in 59.12

Adrienne Sternlicht (USA) and Just A Gamble finished in third on a time of 59.19 seconds for Starlight Farms 1 LLC, while Israel's Ashlee Bond took fourth aboard Belo Horizante, owned by Little Valley Farms. in 59.46 seconds. Quentin Judge (USA) rounded out the top five riding HH Qualido 3, owned by Double H Farm, in 60.17

Also winning in the International Arena at WEF on Friday, Beezie Madden (USA) topped the \$6,000 Bainbridge 1.40m riding Jiva, owned by Abigail Wexner, and Jessica Mendoza (GBR) claimed the \$6,000 Bainbridge Companies 1.40m CSI3* riding Stella Levista, for owner Caroline Mawhinney.

In the International Arena at WEF on Saturday, Caitlin Creel (USA) topped the \$15,000 SJHOF High Amateur/ Owner Jumper Classic, presented by Lugano Diamonds, riding her own Friar M.

Canadian Olympian Tiffany Foster guided new mount Northern Light to a win in the \$37,000 CaptiveOne Advisors 1.50m Classic to close out week three of the 2020 Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF) on Sunday, January 26.

From a starting field of 66, 10 horses advanced to course designer Kelvin Bywater's (GBR) jump-off track. Returning second, Foster put the foot speed of Northern Light, a nine-year-old Swedish Warmblood mare (Plot Blue x Contender) to good use and stopped the clock clear in 42.47 seconds over runner-up Catherine Tyree (USA) and BEC Lorenzo, owned by

Tyree posted a time of 42.56 seconds to finish fractions of a second off the lead, while Great Britain's Emily Moffitt jumped into the top three with Carlson 86 on a clear jump-off performance in 43.41 seconds for owner Poden Farms. Canadian Olympic champion Eric Lamaze took fourth riding Coco Bongo in 44.17 seconds for owner Artisan Farms, LLC, and Jonathan McCrea (USA) capped the top five on Aristoteles V, owned by Windsor Show Stables, in 44.28 seconds.

Wrapping up the week's competition on Sunday in the International Arena, Madison Rauschenbach (USA) won the \$10,000 SJHOF High Junior Jumper Classic, presented by Griffis Residential, riding her own Gillette B, while Lacey Gilbertson (USA) topped the \$10,000 Medium Amateur-Owner Jumper Classic, presented by Celebrity Cruises, aboard Viti de Longa, owned by Seabrook LLC.
