SHANE SWEETNAM AND ALEJANDRO **SPEED TO \$401,000 DOUGLAS ELLIMAN REAL ESTATE GRAND PRIX CSI5* VICTORY**

The first five-star grand prix of the season was a treat for show-iumping fans as Shane Sweetnam (IRL) and Alejandro, owned by Sweet Oak, Spy Coast, & Seabrook LLC, sped to the win in the \$401,000 Douglas Elliman Real Estate Grand Prix CSI5* on Saturday, February 13, at the 2021 Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF).

There were 40 entries in the grand prix competing over a course designed by Kelvin Bywater (GBR). Nine punched their ticket to a clear round and advanced to the jump-off. Riding first in the order in round one and the first to return were FEI World Equestrian Games™ Tryon 2018 (WEG) team gold medalists Devin Ryan (USA) and Eddie Blue.

Ryan opened up Eddie Blue's large stride and covered the jump-off course in 38.74 seconds while leaving all of the jumps up.

"I felt he was really jumping tonight so I decided to give it a little bit of a shot," said Ryan of the 12-year-old 2009 KWPN gelding by VDL Zirocco Blue x Marlon owned by LL Show Jumpers LLC. "He has a massive stride, but he's not the quickest horse in the air. Shane's horse is a bit quicker across the ground, and Martin rode a better track than I did. I could've maybe left out a few strides in a couple places just by turning back a little tighter. I haven't really been in a jump-off in a while or on a consistent basis, and I think you get a little rusty at that level. I just wanted to put down a nice

effort where they had to chase me a bit early on, and it seemed to work out decently."

The next five riders in the jumpoff fell victim to one rail down but clearing the course in fine form was World Number Two Martin Fuchs (SUI) and his 2018 WEG individual silver medalist mount, Clooney 51, a 15-yearold Westphalian gelding by Cornet Obolensky x Ferragamo owned by Luigi Baleri. They brought the winning time down to 37.16 seconds but would have to wait for the final two entries in the ring to determine the outcome.

"I had an extra stride from the third to the fourth fence in the jump-off, which was the original one to two, and that's where I lost it against Shane, who rode a really nice jump-off," recalled Fuchs. "He didn't look like he took that much of a risk; he just let his horse canter and he beat us all today."

It was a solid outing for Clooney 51, who last competed in a five-star event when he won the Rolex Grand Prix in Geneva, Switzerland, in December of 2019. Since then, he only competed in a handful of two-star events in 2020 due to the cancellation of many events in Europe. WEF 5 was his first competition since November.

"When you have a year off of big showing and big classes, everything feels like new again," admitted Fuchs. "I was very nervous today with Clooney even though he has done it all. I wasn't sure how he would perform the first night out again, the first time in a big class, against the best horses in the world. It's really satisfying to see that everything is still in place and that for me as a rider, I still make the right choices and my horse still competes as he did 14 months ago."

U.S. Olympic team gold medalist Beezie Madden and Abigail Wexner's Garant followed Fuchs in the jump-off and put in a smooth clear round in 46.66 seconds to take fourth place.

As the last in the ring for the jumpoff, Sweetnam knew exactly what he had to do, and pushing Alejandro for speed as he crossed the starting timers, he didn't let up through the long gallop to the final oxer on course. They landed clear in 37.03 seconds for

HUNTERS PREPARE FOR WCHR WEEK

Competition for the Green Conformation Hunter division wrapped up on Thursday of WEF 5 in the E.R. Mische Grand Hunter Ring. Jimmy Torano, who was also celebrating his birthday, rode Isalou, Inc.'s Laskano to top honors with three firsts, a second, a third, and a seventh place ribbon.

"The horse just wants to win. He doesn't want to let you down," described Torano, of Wellington, FL. "He actually won a Green 3'6" class right before this, so he won three classes in a row today. He has won so many classes for me in the professional divisions, and also for Daryl in the amateur divisions. He is iust an easy horse."

Michael Murphy, of Apopka, FL, and Kimberly Stewart's Crush received the reserve champion title in the division. The pair earned two firsts, two seconds, a third place.

On Friday, 16 horse-and-rider combinations competed for the championship title in the WEF 2'9" Adult Amateur Hunters in Ring 12. In the end, Debbie Bass, of Gate Mills, OH, rode her own Carat to top honors in the division after earning two firsts and a second-place ribbon.

"He is great in the 2'9" Adult Amateurs and the 3' Adult Amateurs." said Bass of the 14-year-old

Warmblood gelding. "We even went to Capital Challenge, and he was so good and got great scores. He was a diamond in the rough, which are always the best!"

Janice Cannizzo and her own Lozada received reserve champion in the WEF 2'9" Adult Amateur Hunters. Cannizzo, of Lake Worth, FL, rode Lozada to first, third, fourth, and sixth place finishes.

Hunter competition finished in Ring 7 on Saturday with the naming of the Small Junior Hunter 3'6" 16-17 champion. Libbie Gordon and her own High Society took the title after they received three firsts, a third, and a seventh place ribbon.

"I thought he was such a good boy yesterday; he jumped everything super crisp," commented Gordon. "It's so nice showing in the Grand Hunter Ring. It's such a nice size, and I can really get his stride open which allows him to jump well."

Augusta Iwasaki, of Calabasas, CA, rode Sara Hogan's Hamilton to reserve champion in the division. The pair earned three seconds, a fifth, and an eighth place ribbon.

Equitation competition continued on Sunday with the ASPCA Maclay taking place in Ring 9. The class was split into Section A and Section B with thirty-four riders in each section. Eric Krawitt aboard Saludo took home the blue ribbon for Section A, while Natalie Jayne and Bristol Des Tuileries received top honors for Section B.

'He is an experienced equitation horse and today was my first time riding him in the ring," commented Krawitt. "We got off to a great start and he was super today.'



"Obviously Clooney is one of the best horses in the world, and I watched Devin who rode at the start and saw his numbers, so I just thought about having a good rhythm from the start and I tried to do the same as Devin," said Sweetnam of his jump-off plan. "I have a very quick horse, and he's quick in the air. It was very close at the end, so you had to have a bit of luck to get there and it happened today."

Sweetnam started riding Alejandro, a 12-year-old Rheinländer gelding by Acorado's Ass x Contanga, two years ago.

"I got him when he was quite green and raw, and we have built a great relationship," shared Sweetnam. "[The break because of] COVID was good for him because it gave him time to chill out a bit, without traveling and doing bigger classes. Since then, he's really been on form and placed in the top three or four in every grand prix he has done.

"At the start of circuit, I blew the three-star under the lights," he continued. "I was too far off the last fence, so I was mad at myself. It wasn't really his fault, so I made up for it today and he made the difference."

Don Langdon, Managing Broker at Douglas Elliman Real Estate, said he was elated with how their competition has gone this week at WEF.

"This is our sixth year of sponsoring the CSI5* event, and every year is just more enjoyable than the last," he said. "I know in sports it's very challenging to get into a 'zone' at the right time and with all the challenges we've had this year, for the three of you to have a night like tonight, you must feel really good. I can tell you from a spectator's point of view, we were all so excited through the whole night. Number one, we were excited to be out, and number two, to watch the event with the way it started off with Devin and finished with Shane and Martin. You competed so well. I don't know if we give as much kudos of the athleticism of the three of you riders as we should, but I'm happy I was there."

Concluding the night, Fuchs noted, "I also want to say thank you very much for [Douglas Elliman Real Estate's] support in sponsoring this amazing grand prix. For us riders, it's great that we get to come here to Florida and show at WEF. At home in Europe, there are only CSI2* classes and not really the level that we would like to compete at. For me, this is a great opportunity that I get to jump here and that we have so many generous CSI5^* classes, so thank you from all the riders."



A LOOK AT MARTHA JOLICOEUR'S LEADING LADIES

The inaugural Martha Jolicoeur Leading Lady Rider Award, created to honor women in horse sport, was first presented at the Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF) in 2011. Jolicoeur, herself a former international show jumping competitor and now one of Florida's leading realtors, developed the idea as a way of recognizing female athletes in an Olympic sport where men and women compete as equals.

"When I was competing, one of my biggest goals was to try and earn the leading lady rider accolades because it usually meant you were having a banner show," said Jolicoeur, who claimed the American Grand Prix Association (AGA) Rookie of the Year title in 1985.

Jolicoeur's Leading Lady Award, which she presents in memory of fellow realtor and horsewoman Dale Lawler, puts the spotlight on women who achieve success at one of the most competitive show circuits in the world - the Winter Equestrian Festival. Each week, points are tabulated from the WEF Challenge Cup and feature grand prix event to determine the Leading Lady. The Martha Jolicoeur Leading Lady Rider Award is then presented following the grand prix during each week of WEF. In addition, the female competitor who accumulates the most points throughout the 13-week circuit earns the Overall WEF Leading Lady Rider Award.

The list of Leading Lady Award winners over the past decade reads like a who's who of show jumping sport. U.S. Olympians Margie Engle and Lauren Hough, two-time Olympic team gold medalist Beezie Madden, and international riders such as three-time World Cup Final winner

Meredith Michaels-Beerbaum of Germany and two-time Canadian Olympian Tiffany Foster have all claimed the Overall title.

"It's always great to be recognized for consistency throughout the week, and the prizes that Martha offers are super," said Madden, who was the first rider to claim back-to-back Overall Leading Lady titles in 2011 and 2012. "It's nice to have a unique award to keep things interesting, and I've always loved winning this title."

The woman who has won the most weekly Leading Lady titles is a legend in her own right. Florida's own Engle even enjoyed her first facial thanks for one of Jolicoeur's innovative prizes.

"It's always an honor to receive this award, and we really appreciate Martha's dedication to promoting women in horse sport and what makes our sport so special," said Engle, who won the Overall Leading Lady title in 2018.

Canada's Foster agreed, adding, "I think it is awesome that Martha offers this award, and it's also very inspiring for us because she's a leading lady in her own industry."

For the 2021 season Jolicoeur, who is part of the elite Douglas Elliman Real Estate Sports and Entertainment division, and her husband, Dr. Stephen Norton of Norton Dental Arts, will present the leading ladies with a bottle of champagne, a beautiful bouquet of fresh flowers, and a gift certificate for a Hunt Ltd. shopping spree each



Cian O'Connor and Careca LS Elite Capture the \$50,000 Restylane Grand Prix CSI2*

It was the luck of the Irish on Sunday afternoon as Cian O'Connor piloted Careca LS Elite, owned by Ronnoco Jump Ltd, to a victory in the \$50,000 Restylane Grand Prix CSI2*. The track set by Kelvin Bywater (GBR) narrowed the field from 44 to just seven combinations qualifying for the jump-off and the final class of WEF 5 proved to be another exciting one.

First to go in the starting order and first to return for the jump-off, O'Connor put forth a double clear effort aboard the 10-year-old SLS gelding by Carusso LS La Silla x Rebozo LS, to stop the clock in 45.65 seconds.

"He's a very intelligent horse with a wonderful canter," said O'Connor. "He has a super technique in front so you can really put him close to the jumps, and he has a great way of jumping. When he's fresh he's a little bit keen so he needs plenty of jumping, plenty of classes, and you can really feel there today in the jump-off he was really easy to ride. He can turn back short and he's catty at the jumps, so it really makes my job easy to go fast on him."

The last entry to go was the one to come closest as Rachel Cornacchia (CAN) and Valkyrie De Talma, owned by Eventyre Farms, flew across the course with a double clear effort. The 32-yearold rider from Calgary, Alberta, came up just short aboard the 12-year-old Selle Français mare by Diamant De Semilly x Reggae De Talma, finishing two-hundredths of a second off the mark in 45.67 seconds. It was Jennifer Waxman (USA) and Mecho Van't Kiezelhof, owned by the Triple S Group, that rounded out the podium with a double clear finish in 46.07 seconds

O'Connor has had 'Careca' for the past year, speaking highly of his talent, noting that he is pleased with the gelding's development thus far.

"I saw him last year through a friend of mine Enda Carroll at Ashford Farm," said O'Connor. "We bought the horse and brought him on with some national grand prix classes in Ireland where he did well. There haven't been many shows because of the pandemic so it's really about building him up and using these classes to get used to him. He's been very good in all the national classes he's jumped so I decided to put him up to the CSI2* this week, and he coped really well."

The Olympic individual bronze medalist who has represented Ireland in 15 international championships has a string of up-and-coming horses at WEF this season with a very specific goal in mind for the 2021 season.

"We look at the season with an overall goal and try to work backwards from that target," he said. "There's obviously a lot of uncertainty with the Olympic Games but that's still the main focus to work towards. We're working backwards from there in terms of classes and how we produce the horses. My main horse PSG Final is the one I'll be aiming at that. He's picked up a little injury at the moment, so he'll be out of action for about a month. I'm building up Cadiz and Kilkenny so I have 'Plan B' and 'Plan C' in place."

O'Connor will continue to campaign for the duration of WEF while also training students at the elite level, including Nicole Walker who represents Canada and up-and-coming riders Max and Tom Wachman, who have already had success in the early stages of circuit.
