#### HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT: 37

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

As reported in our initial report, Holy Ground decided to allocate the funds as follows:

- \$80,000 to establish our new reserve fund (represents three months of operating expenses)
- \$50,000 to pay off the loan we used to purchase our residential campus
- \$10,000 to create a transportation fund for our clients
- \$10,000 to create a childcare fund for our clients

Since June 1, we have used:

• **\$1689.40** from our childcare account: This enabled our clients to attend our regular, mandatory Life Skills sessions (held in the evenings), while their little ones were cared for by our part-time nannies, who were paid out of this account.

Here are our two nannies enjoying nanny time with our Holy Ground children. See the laughing one on the right? That's Mayra, who was previously in our program! Now that she is successfully living independently, she was eager to use her childcare expertise to give back to Holy Ground for the assistance we gave her. We are thrilled to have her as a nanny (along with her friend and co-nanny, Esmeralda), and even more proud that Mayra and her beautiful little girl are making it on their own.



This amount also includes \$967 for daycare costs. Thus far, we have used \$2491.70 of the childcare funds.



• **\$3221.88** from our transportation account: This continues to be a major assist to both our organization and our clients. The costs of gas, car repairs, bus fares and Uber often do a hit-and-run on the budgets of low-income families such as our clients. Holy Ground had been helping our clients through such transportation-related incidents by offering zero-interest loans (e.g., for car repairs) or by giving rides ourselves, but these had caused both budget and resource crunches for the organization. With this transportation fund, we can cover these expenses without impacting our operating account.



The client shown (with her daughter), who works as a home health aide, needed four new tires on her car at the same time that her insurance payment was due. Try as she might, she could not come up with all that cash. Fortunately, our transportation account came to the rescue, so she can now drive safely to work on good tires, and in an insured car!

This amount represents expenditures for rides from Uber, car repairs, car insurance, bus passes, and gasoline. Thus far, we have used \$4,388.38 of the transportation funds.

\$50,000, as noted earlier, went to pay off the loan on our residential complex, the Stockard Family Campus. In addition to residential units, the campus includes the Fr. Seamus Murtagh Community Suite, named for one of our hardest-working patrons. This suite includes meeting space, a full kitchen and living room, space for emergency shelter, and shared computers for our clients' use. Here, one of our clients uses the community computer to search for jobs.



• The **\$80,000** in our reserves remains untouched.

As described in the last report, the stability created by our reserve fund and by being debt-free, as well as the funds now available to all of our clients for childcare and transportation (removing the need for the organization to take these funds out of operating), benefits our entire family of clients. This family now numbers 37 (16 busy moms and 21 healthy children): 12 mothers and 16 children in residence, 3 moms and 5 children in our Aftercare program (living independently), and 1 young mother currently in emergency shelter, who is due to deliver her baby on September 11. So our family continues to grow!

Emma was the first patient to ring the newly installed End of Treatment Bell on the Pediatric Oncology Unit at Palms West Children's Hospital. The bell was donated by the **Kids Cancer Foundation** so that all the young children cancer patients can ring the bell as part of their End of Treatment celebration. Emma rang the bell while her Pediatric Oncologist, Dr. Melissa Singer and all her Pediatric Oncology Nurses sang "Happy End of Treatment". After Emma rang the bell loudly three times & was showered in "silly string" Emma and her family enjoyed a celebration party with a cake and gifts for Emma & her sisters. At the celebration Emma was also presented with the final legacy bead making her strand of "Legacy Beads" 28 feet long! Needless to say it was a happy day for all! This would not be possible if not for the funding from the Great Charity Challenge that enables the **Kids Cancer Foundation** to provide many vital programs and services to our brave young patients and their families. **HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT:** For the period of May 23, 2019 to September 2, 2019 we were able to assist **1814** children on 1079 cases. Of the 1814 children, 289 were newly sheltered during this period (continued high rate of shelter). Volunteers drove 51,334 miles to advocate for the children during this period volunteering 5486 hours (recorded). Best interest attorneys represented the children's best interest in 2607 (recorded) hearings during this period.

#### Here is "JM's" story:

JM is a 6 year old Autistic boy who was recently removed from his father for the second time. He has been struggling behaviorally a bit, but is a very smart little boy and a fast learner. When speaking with his Behavioral Technician about what type of toys or games to bring for JM, the topic of the newly donated Leap Frogs came up and we figured that a tool like a Leap Frog that can make learning fun would be an excellent resource. When JM opened the Leap Frog, he excitedly said "Open please!" and immediately plugged it in to charge and turn on. We worked together to set it up, and he got busy playing with the already installed programs. His grandmother thanked us for such a nice and helpful gift to encourage her grandson to play to learn.



#### Meet Carlos:

Carlos Jefferson with Guardian ad Litem Volunteer, Ellen Kranzler. Carlos was "Tracy's Mom", a lead in Hairspray. He is walking the walk, not just dreaming and we wanted to help him be even better. Through these funds, we were able to secure voice lessons.



#### Meet DB: Look at that smile!

Children in foster care tend to get behind in school from the disruption in their lives, changing of placements and schools. "Project Leap Frog" was something we were able to do so that our kids could keep learning over the summer. We also were able to get pictures of the kids!

D.B. is a four year old boy who has not attended pre-school regularly. He was reunified with his mother and started VPK. It is important for him (and his mom) to have the tools for success. We are proud of her for working her case plan and removing the risk factors that had him removed. She had the desire to change and





did! This Leap Frog helped him foster his educational needs. This is another tool for his educational stimulation.

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

This Fund Use Report is an update for the \$50,000 allocated for this period for our *2019 Back to School Bash* held on July 27, 2019. We are so appreciative of the significant Great Charity Challenge Grant which enabled us to make a greater impact by developing new relationships to reach more children, expand the supplies and resources provided to the students and improve the quality of the offerings. Further, the funds allowed us to upgrade our computers, equipment and work with new technology to increase efficiencies with the check-in process and overall experience for the families. New additions included a "Girls Only" Room that offered bras, bra fittings and feminine products to these underserved young ladies. Based on feedback, modest over the ear headphones were included as well as KidSafe Guide Books.

Your generous grant touched many organizations and enabled us to help more at-risk children in southern Palm Beach Communities. At the Bash, registered students were paired with volunteer "Shopping Buddies" and empowered to select their own backpack, supplies, uniforms and shoes. In addition, their families were navigated through a complimentary health and resource fair offering medical and dental screenings, physicals, vision tests, haircuts, healthy snacks and access to various free or reduced cost community resources.

The 2019 Back to School Bash brought together over 50 nonprofits, 30 community partners, and 420+ individual volunteers to benefit nearly 4,400 students and their families.

## HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

Jeff Industries, Inc. began in 1983 as a small, community effort led by a group of parents who worked together to help individuals with chronic mental illness transition from mental hospitals into their respective communities. The "*Live, Learn, Work*" program offers evidenced- based "Peer-to-Peer" support and "Supported Employment" practices. With the Great Charity Challenge \$73,000 award we purchased vocational training materials (\$28,231.45), a new screen-printing machine and a printer (\$25,959.47) that provided additional training opportunities and paid modest training wages (\$18,809.08) to persons who suffer severe and persistent mental illnesses. The successful "LIVE, LEARN, WORK" program has blossomed into a highly regarded, vocational training and employment model. The program provided adults with chronic mental illnesses





health education, social, networking, hands-on-training skills (woodworking, sign making, embroidery, graphics and culinary arts) and facilitated competitive employment services.

The Great Charity Challenge award helped our clients manufacture "Buddy Benches" for Mental Health America. These benches are a central component to the program equipping elementary students to deal with the "bullying" crisis that has been exposed across the nation. Our clients build the benches in our woodworking shop and install them in elementary schools. In the photo Neil is completing a bench installation.

Jeff Industries received the "Buddy Ambassadors Campaign/Project" award on September 12<sup>th</sup>. Staff Bruce, Matt and Claudia), a parent (Mrs. Barlage) and participants (Josh, Christoff, Richard, Elijah, Ali, and Andrew) attended the breakfast award. The clients worked on the benches and the silkscreen printed shirts that were given to the Ambassadors.

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

One third of funding was used to provide tennis and golf camp opportunities for underserved children. These children are identified through our partner agencies. Together, we plan summer curriculum designed to teach both athletics skills and life skills. Campers learn and practice the values of teamwork, dedication, and sportsmanship. Campers are provided a T-shirt, shoes, socks, and daily lunch.

One third of funding was used to create a camp training portal for camp counselors to learn how to keep kids safe from and recognize sexual abuse. The Boca West Children's Foundation Empower Camps training portal will be available online shortly. We are working with 2Ton Creative and KidSafe (utilize their best practices and curriculum).

One third of funding was used for education. About \$11,000 was used for our Back to School event serving children living at or below poverty. Pine Grove Elementary School has been identified as a Title I school where more than 95 percent of students are on free and reduced lunch. These children will not have to worry about their supplies for next school year. Each child at Pine Grove Elementary received a new backpack filled with all of the supplies they need. Supplies included a backpack with a hard binder, two three-prong folders, 20 pencils, a pencil box, pens, 4 composition books, highlighters, erasers, index cards, crayons, markers, colored pencils, a gluestick, and hundreds of sheets of notebook paper. The backpacks were distributed on August 9 at the school's Meet the Teacher Event. The teachers and parents were very appreciative! What a fun day!

#### HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT: 300

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

The Senior Caregiving Program supports over 300 Palm Beach County seniors in low-income households by providing home-based services and critical food deliveries.

This year, more than 100 seniors participated in social activities with a focus on strength: Physical, Mental, and Spiritual Strength. We had chair yoga, Mother's & Father's Day, Black History month, a trip to the "Holy Land Experience," and several guest speakers from City and County departments regarding financial programs available for home maintenance concerns, etc. We took a group to Tallahassee Senior Day at the State Capital. It was an amazing experience and next year we would like to go again and include seniors from all the neighborhoods we serve—which will be an amazing cross-cultural opportunity.

Our Chronic Condition Care Meals Program now serves 59 Palm Beach County seniors with weekly deliveries of pre-packaged, diet-specific meals. In the most recent survey, 88% of participants reported noticeable changes in their health and energy levels within a month of receiving meals.

We are seeing real results with the seniors who have been participating in the program for more time. Rebecca was referred to us in November of 2018 by her chronic care physician. She was in and out of the hospital and losing weight. Dr. Gonzales asked us to her deliver high protein/no sodium meals. At first, Rebecca would come to the door with an unkept appearance, looking exhausted and impatient. She struggled a few more times with hospital visits during the first month or two of our service. Today, Theresa is dressed with her make-up on when she opens the door, she is gaining weight and had the energy to entertain her grandchildren this summer.

Our award helped us bring these chronic condition care meals to the seniors we were already serving in Boynton Beach AND expand our services to bring fresh produce to seniors in Delray Beach and Boca Raton who were previously only receiving chronic condition care meals.

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

In this quarter, Genesis Assistance Dogs, Inc. used a portion of our funding to continue the training for Grigsby and Cloud, our newest puppies in training. They are both doing exceedingly well with their puppy raisers and our Director of Training, Jennifer Bielen is very pleased with their progress. Finn is also benefitting from amped up training sessions as he nears completion of his journey to become a Genesis Assistance Dog ready to work with his forever person. Lake was able to continue his training and went on to pass his CGC and ADI tests.

Oliver continues to receive specialized training to improve his tasks for his partner Julie, who works at a high school. In August when faculty and staff returned to campus, a staff of 185 people were provided education regarding the appropriate way to approach and interact with an assistance dog team. Julie and Oliver are now visiting classrooms to teach students about the importance of the work service dogs perform and how vital they are to the people they serve.

Another portion of our funding allowed for us to be able to make significant improvements to our newly designed website. We are now focusing heavily on improving our SEO to improve Genesis Assistance Dogs, Inc. searchability on a variety of search engines. The impact of being readily detectable has resulted in increasing outreach into the disabled community. We are empowered with the ability to provide considerable education and support to those seeking information on the process of applying for an assistance dog. In turn, there has been a noticeable increase in our intake of applications for an assistance dog and inquiries about service dogs in general.





Genesis Assistance Dogs, Inc. is very grateful for the funds allocated to us from the Great Charity Challenge and to our sponsors for this fabulous event: Lothlorien Farm and Dever. Their support of the GCC has afforded us the opportunity to continue to provide upkeep and on-going training to our existing clients in addition to the newest additions to our organization. *Please note that all funds were utilized during the first quarter according to our prior report:* 

Our **Backgound Connections** program provided Level 2 background screening for over 202 clients to ensure that the families who are caring for the children placed with them have no criminal history. We have hired a Student Success Coordinator for our **Educational Connections** program which provides children in foster care with individualized, intensive in-home tutoring that leads to comprehensive success in school and life. Our **Enriching Connections** program has providing funding for a sponsorship for the Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Seminar at Palm Beach Atlantic University. We



were able to send a 16 year old sophomore in foster care. We are also hosting a School's Out Splash Party to celebrate not only the successful end of the school year, but to give foster children the opportunity to enjoy the day with their siblings that may be placed in other foster homes. Through our FAPA Connections program, we are hosting a Foster Parent Appreciation luncheon and award ceremony for all of our licensed foster parents to show our appreciation for their tireless work. Our Kinship Connections program has begun hosting support groups for our relative foster caregivers and has begun offering play therapy groups for the foster children in their home. We meet regularly on Wednesday nights with childcare provided so the families can deal with the tough issues that they are faced with in family foster care. Resource Connections continues to be our most utilized program and provides tangible items for all of the foster families in Palm Beach County. Additionally,



we will be hosting a graduation party for 40 youth who graduated from high school or college this year. We are excited for their success and want to share in their celebration.

## HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

Once again with your generous donation, the mentees and their mentors were able to come together and engage in some acrobatic activities at the Adrenelene Entertainment Center. It turned out to be an exciting activity. In addition, the mentees and some of their mentors were invited to a Back to School Bash at Children's Home Society to get our students ready to return to school. Project 18 Mentoring program backpacks were full of school supplies. We had volunteers available to assist with the event which was GREAT. Model Mentoring had the mentees to pick their own backpacks and select the school supplies of their choice. All participants were also provided lunch and a drink as they left the event. Project 18 Mentoring program stuffed their backpacks with supplies and the youth were able to pick their backpacks as well and dinner was provided to those that were in attendance.

The funds were also used for training the mentors on the topic of "Boundaries." Because 98% of our mentors are employed, we must offer training after 5:00pm and your funding allowed us to do so by offering the mentor's dinner as they came directly from work to the training.

**HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT**: Through the Great Charity Challenge grant, we were able to provide 1,250+ new uniforms for over **1,250** students this year through our Uniform Program.

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

We allocated \$10,000 of the grant towards new school uniforms, which have just been delivered for the beginning of the new school year. This accounts for over 1,250 additional uniforms. The schools in the Glades area are some of the neediest in Palm Beach County. One of our goals this year was to increase the allocations to each of the elementary schools in the Glades to allow for at least one new uniform for each student. As a result of this grant, we were able to increase the number of uniforms and accomplish that goal! Thank you Great Charity Challenge for helping us to make this a reality.

The remaining \$17,000 will be used for the Angel Program to provide new sneakers, socks, underwear and a toy for over 7,500 children in need during the holidays. Now that the Uniform Program has wrapped up, we are jumping right into the Angel Program.

After he utilized our mobile services, he started attending our campus four days per week. Last semester, I'm proud to say he earned a 3.7 GPA. Furthermore, he is working on course recovery to enhance his GPA from prior struggles. He future goals includes junior college followed by university. #### HIGHLIGHTS FROM SOME OF THE LIVES THAT WERE SAVED:

HENRY & HENLEY lived outside together in a tiny cage for at least one year, probably longer. A Good Samaritan was able to intervene and bring these two Shih Tzu to our Veterinary Clinic. Our vet was shocked by their condition, so covered with matted feces, fleas, and ticks that their coats had to be cut with surgical scissors before they could be shaved while under anesthesia. They are now living in their adopted homes!





Precious LUCILLE was brought to our local vet when

her owners who could not afford medical treatment. This little munchkin is about 14 weeks old and weighs only 2.8 pounds. She had a horribly malformed and infected right front leg, caused by something that had been wrapped around her leg, possibly a wire. The only option was to amputate, but she will be just fine as a tripod!

HUCKLEBERRY was found inside a cardboard

box left beside a garbage can outside of our veterinary clinic. A clinic receptionist was outside on her break and saw what she thought was a taped up box of trash. She opened it to find this puppy suffering in the heat and struggling to breathe from lack of oxygen. His leg had obviously been broken at least 7 days prior and then wrapped with duct tape way too tight, cutting off circulation for days. If there was any chance to save the leg this puppy needed to see a vet right away, now his only option is amputation. Danny & Ron's Rescue immediately said "YES!" we could cover the medical costs and find him a loving home. We named this Redbone Hound mix "Huckleberry".

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

The funds received are being utilized as wages for our team of part-time employees. This is ongoing. We hire the less fortunate and at-risk individuals into our transitional, part-time work program. We work on the beach to collect marine debris to protect and conserve our environment. At any time, we have from 3 to 5 individuals on our team. Currently, the average work period for these individuals runs from one week to 6 months. Starting wage is \$10/hour, average work week is 20-25 hours. We have had 2 transition in and out since the last report in June.

We hire our teammates through a few agencies that have job-ready candidates but who face challenges and barriers to employment. The Lord's Place is one of those agencies. The Lord's Place is a non-profit advocacy organization that has been changing the lives of homeless families and individuals in Palm Beach County for over 30 years. We also hire through Vita Nova and Goodwill Industries.

Another participant needed some repairs done to her yard, Wellington Cares teamed with Faith Church on purchasing some of the items needed for the repairs, and Faith Church did the labor.

Participants Lenny & Claire S. have expressed their heartfelt appreciation for the rides the volunteers have been providing taking Lenny to dialysis 3 times a week. Claire suffers from an illness that prevents her from driving him to his treatments, so the volunteers will continue to help them with their transportation needs.

Funding from the 2019 Great Charity Challenge directly supported the ACCF service delivery to underresourced children and families in the south Palm Beach County by providing high-quality early learning programs for 121 young children, out-of-school programming for 584 children in grades K-12, summer camp, and family support services for over 600 area families. ACCF children receive evidence-based curricula through four program pillars: academics, the arts, physical wellness, and socio-emotional learning. Families are also taught strategies through which they can meaningfully engage in their child's development through access to counseling, parenting and literacy workshops, linkages & referrals, case management, and crisis supports when needed.



On behalf of the students, families, staff, and Board of Directors, ACCF thanks you for making moments like this possible in our students' lives. The opportunities provided for allow students and families to learn from teachers and family engagement staff, and receive the emotional, community, and crisis-intervention supports that they may need.

#### Meet Thomas\*:

Thomas came to the Achievement Centers when he was just 12 months old. As the youngest of three, he was too small to remember the violence his father inflicted upon his siblings and single mother. Thankfully, from the time of his first birthday through his 7th, Thomas found a safe refuge from the arguments and trauma that too often plague under-resourced homes like his own. At Achievement Centers, instead of threats and bullying, he found love and warmth.

At ACCF, Thomas' fear gave way to freedom, screaming at home became gentle, soft-spoken words; and a constant cry out for attention became continuous cheers and hugs from his new ACCF "Aunties" and teachers. "My son flourished at ACCF," Carol\* explained. "I had a job and there was no other childcare I could afford. I had no idea of the kind of impact that it would have on my son."

Though only in 1st grade, Thomas has made the Honor Roll on every report card. He has a love for school that other parents could only dream about. "The teachers write to me all the time telling me how polite and helpful Thomas is, and how much he loves to learn," Carol said. "That's all because of the love and academic supports that he received at ACCF!"

Carol credits ACCF's family atmosphere for her son's academic interest and wonderful social ability. "At ACCF, Thomas learned that he is part of a large family, that he has plenty of people to care for him, and because of that, he has a better sense of himself."

"When I look at children in the neighborhood who did not attend ACCF, I see a difference. ACCF kids are more loving, calm, and stronger emotionally. They look out for others, and you usually don't see that at this age."

Carol points to the first day at Kindergarten as a good example of Thomas' social and emotional stability. "All of the parents that were at kindergarten on the first day of school watched as their children cried and had tantrums about being in the classroom. The ACCF kids made their way in, sat down, and quietly started playing together with the new toys. They were the most mature kindergarteners I ever saw!"

Thomas has already become a leader in his family and at ACCF. We expect him to continue to grow in responsibility and conscientiousness; no doubt he will one day become an important leader in our community. *Names changed to protect the privacy of the people we serve.*

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

We used the funds to provide emergency shelter for 67 victims of domestic violence by providing safety, food, the cost of housing and utilities, pro bono legal representation, school uniforms, prescriptions, transportation costs, childcare fees, relocation funds and permanent housing rental/utility deposits. Clients were provided with a safe and nurturing environment in which to heal both physically and emotionally while continuing to save and prepare for permanent housing of their own. We received another grant to hire a Housing Coordinator who has been able to place every family in a permanent home as she also helped them to save, budget, obtain employment and/or return to school/training for better jobs. Our advocate provided counseling, advocacy, education and support groups so clients could better cope with their independence and enhance and strengthen their families. We provided families with furniture and household goods when they obtained their new housing and helped them move into their new homes.

"Janelle" and her 2 children fled Delaware and drove straight through to Florida to a friend's house after Janelle had been beaten and denigrated in front of the children for 2 days in a row. When they arrived at the friend's house, the abuser was waiting, believing correctly that is where she and the children would go. She drove to the nearest police station where she was given our brochure and encouraged to call our 24/7 crisis line. She was still scared and the children were also afraid. She didn't understand how domestic violence programs worked, she was afraid she might be separated from her children and she was traumatized from no sleep and the injuries she received from the abuser's beatings. She drove to the nearest emergency room and slept in her car with her



children. A security guard found her and brought her and the children into the hospital where the social worker called Our Sister's Place for assistance.

Working with our attorney and staff, Janelle and her family have started a new life that has brought them independence and opportunities to be a loving family. They have their own apartment and Janelle has an excellent position with Palm Beach County. Through the support and care of Our Sister's Place, they have moved forward and continue to thrive. The children have acclimated to Florida and have new friends and activities. The collaboration between the police department, the hospital and Our Sister's Place shows the importance of a community working together to address violence against women and children.

The Council used the funds as planned to support the Educational Impact Study as well as the arts and culture education manager to deliver Arts in My Backyard (AIMBY) Programs to Title I students which include Family Saturdays and Afterschool programming at the Council's Headquarters in Lake Worth.

The students who participated in the AIMBY, Afterschool program in partnership with the Kravis Center for the Performing Arts thoroughly enjoyed their exposure to the "world of musical theater." They learned of the various roles and responsibilities that come with the production of a musical, studied the 'world of the play', dance, themes, costuming of the LION KING and even received the opportunity to see the LION King live at the Kravis Center.

While watching the performance, the students were amazed by the production and how much they understood about the play (due to their lessons prior to attending). Immediately following the production, the students attended a private talk-back session with three cast members-Puma, The Giraffe (who was also the dance captain) and Young Simba. The students asked questions and the session proved itself to be informative and inspiring for the students.



To close out the arts program, the students engaged in a culminating event which allowed them to perform a choreographic dance to "The Circle of Life", LION KING. Both the parents and the community members who attended were amazed at the passion displayed on the faces of the children –performers, their excitement as they shared their personal experiences and their smiles as they laughed and shared memories that will last for a life time. Funds were spent (during the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter) on programming for at-risk youth. STEM Science Passport features technology, engineering, and math-based activities and experiments employing deductive reasoning and critical thinking skills. Students from economically disadvantaged communities throughout Palm Beach and Broward County learn how to outline simple experiments, develop a valid means to test problem-solving hypothesis, and communicate effectively about cause-and-effect relationships.

STEM Science Passport is comprised of two main elements: a special outreach class visit by a Center educator to a Title I school, followed by a special one-hour science class at the Center. All expenses, including bus transportation fees from the school to the Center and back, are paid for by the program.

Tia Duhaney is a Jamaican-American school girl whose life was changed by the Science Center. She has taken part in grant funded Science Center programming for multiple years and it has opened her eyes to the world of technology and science that she previously thought was closed off due to her gender and race.

This grant is for \$152,000 which will enable us to serve 2 more families. There is another Federal Home grant RFP expected in mid-September that we are following.

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

We paid \$6,750 for the audit and 990 tax return. Without those two things we could not apply for either of these grants. We have paid an additional \$102.57 for rent. By moving our offices we can already see the savings. We have paid an additional \$1,680 to the Executive Assistant so that we can raise additional funds to build these homes. The grant for which we are applying now is \$152,000 and we need to raise an additional \$150,000 to complete these homes. So far we have spent \$14,107.43 of the \$15,500. This has enabled us to compete for a Federal HOME Grant for \$152,000 plus contact foundations, corporations and individuals to make up the additional funding we need. Another big thank you from 5 families to The Crown Family and Equine Tack and Nutritionals.

**HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT:** We provided training for 10 Lay Leaders to be trained in the Stanford University's Diabetes Self-Management/Chronic Disease Self-Management Programs. Now that we have lay leaders trained, they will work in pairs delivering the programs in low-income senior communities. Since the training two workshops have been completed, one will start in Okeechobee in September and two more in Palm Beach in October. These are evidence-based workshops and allow for 16 participants in each. The impact to date is **42 people** but we expect this number to grown exponentially with the upcoming workshops.

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

Participants of Diabetes Self-Management and Chronic Disease Self-Management Programs make weekly action plans, share experiences, and help each other solve problems they encounter while dealing with their chronic conditions. Each week different subjects are touched on that will empower and strengthen the participants physically and emotionally. Each workshop meets for 6 weeks, once a week for 2 ½ hours.



In order to secure the license to train and deliver the programs there is a licensing fee of \$500. The cost of the training including printing of coaches/ lay leader manuals, <u>Living a Healthy Life with Chronic Conditions</u> and contractual services was \$3607.00.

The remainder of the funds have supported the delivery of the workshops in the community. Each participant will receive a copy of <u>Living a Healthy Life with Chronic Conditions</u> as well as all program handouts.

"Thank you so much for presenting this six week course on Diabetes Self-Management. It was very informative, instructional and helpful as we navigate our lives with this disease. We have learned so many new things; have been inspired by our group as well as from our Leaders. The Leaders were "a super team". "It was truly a pleasure to be a part of "Living Healthy." I feel so lucky to have found this workshop I learned a lot about myself and what it means to "get a little older"-for me anyway. The coaches were a blessing and I look forward to perhaps seeing them again in another class during my journey of aging.

It has been wonderful to see the impact on the participant as well as the coaches. They have told me the weekly action plan has made all the difference in helping them stay on task to make healthy choices and the participants said it holds them accountable. It is a gift to be able to help someone age with dignity, confidence and respect. This grant has allowed us to expand the number of individuals served in our community, we are grateful for the opportunity.

**HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT:** Since receiving the grant in February, we have helped **101** individuals: 85 adults and 15 children.



#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

The funds were used to provide English language literacy instruction for 85 adults and 15 children. The adult students were divided into four classes based on their literacy level. The children, ages 3 - 5, are in a separate class where they learn essential school readiness skills.

Once a week the parents join the children in PACT (Parent and Child Together) activities in which the families learn simple, inexpensive ways they can extend learning to their home. Once a month we use our program's mini-bus to bring the families to the Belle Glade branch of the Palm Beach County Library System. We want the families to feel comfortable in – and use – this important, free, educational resource. The children's librarian also conducts a special story time for our children that is coordinated to support the theme that has been our program's focus of instruction for the month.



Left: In this photo, the children and their mothers are doing an activity as part of the story time based on the classic children's book, *The Very Hungry Caterpillar*. Children were involved in counting, naming the items eaten by the caterpillar and naming the days of the week. After the story, the librarian provided children with picture cards so that they could sequence events. The families received a bag with a book, the story sequencing cards, a library card application and a flyer that helps parents register to use a program sponsored by the PBC Library System called Transparent Language Online.

Right: Every afternoon before the children take a nap, the mothers leave their own class to read a book to their child. The teachers help the mothers learn strategies to incorporate sharing a book as part of the child's bedtime rituals.

#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

Our goal is to develop and support meaningful employment opportunities, which lead to a decrease in dependency on public benefits and opens career paths to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.



Funds from the great Charity Challenge support pre-employment training and employment opportunities offered at the Arc of Palm Beach County. In late March, employment services was able to successfully match a VR client with disabilities, Brian, with an employment opportunity at Gehring Group. After being introduced to the Arc at Job-A-Palooza in 2018, it was determined that with proper supports, Brian would make an excellent addition to the Gehring group team. The Arc assisted Brian's family in accessing placement services with the

Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (VR). The supported employment coach in collaboration with Brian and his family created an employment support plan which included vocation specific training and ongoing supported employment services for Brian, as well as disability sensitivity training for Gehring Group. Over the past couple of month Brian has become an integral member of the Gehring group team, preparing benefits packets for their customers and serving as the office greeter.

Town of Palm Beach United Way commissioned Evan, a new participant in the Artisan program, to create one of a kind portrait of their Board Chair. Evan was able to attend the annual meeting at the Breakers where the portrait was presented. The Arc was honored to be a part of this project. Artisan has been busy with events and custom orders. We were invited for the first time to participate in the Home & Design Show at the Palm Beach Convention Center and the 57th Annual Delray Affair. We are thrilled to have opportunities like these to showcase our artwork and participate in the community.

#### HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT:

With the support of the Great Charity Challenge, our agency assisted **1,940 families and individuals** impacted by severe poverty, homelessness, and other barriers to self-sufficiency. Within this figure, we housed 390 people, including 111 children. In addition, we served 547 people living on the streets, in cars, abandoned buildings, homeless encampments, and other places not meant for human habitation - a 59% increase over the previous year. Lastly, we connected 115 vulnerable jobseekers to employment, enabling them to take a critical step to improving their family's circumstances.

#### What a Difference a Day Makes

A single mom moved into the Family Campus in May with her three children -a boy in grade school, a girl in middle school, and the oldest, a teenager who just graduated from Forest Hill High School, named Senay. Unfortunate family circumstances brought them to Family Campus. But fortunately, the children's mother is a college graduate, and has always been very involved with her children's education. As proof, Senay graduated with high honors and had successfully completed all advanced placement courses.

On the same day the family was moving in, our youth services team visited their apartment to tell the family about its services. Since the team helps register all Family Campus children in school, the conversation turned to Senay. They wanted to know what plans she had for the next school year, now that she was out of high school.

Hesitantly, Senay replied that she was not sure. She didn't think college was an option due to her living and financial circumstances. But when we told her that college actually was in reach for her, a glow and smile came to her face.

In an instant, Senay went from hopeless to hopeful. She asked, "You could really make that happen for me?" Our answer was that we would meet with her tomorrow to put a plan into action.

Senay was ready that next day to tell us what she wanted to do: attend Palm Beach State College for two years of core courses, then transfer to a four year school. She wished to major in English literature and minor in psychology. The youth services team sprang into action. They took her over to the college admissions office to register and set her up for freshman orientation, which she and her mother attended together.

And so in just one day, Senay's future is looking a whole lot brighter, thanks to all the services provided here at The Lord's Place, the youth services team, and our wonderful, generous donors. Doors to the future open here, sometimes even overnight. Just ask Senay!

HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT: 120 inner city kids in kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup> grade



#### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

Urban Youth Impact exists to love, equip and empower inner city youth to fulfill their God-given purposes. Kids growing up in the inner city face many obstacles, so our mission of equipping these students is carried out in many different manners. The lack of education is one issue that stands out in the inner city. Because of the staggering educational statistics of the inner city, Urban Youth Impact developed The Leadership Academy after school program which focuses on literacy.

In the fall of 2018, out of the 120 kids registered for The Leadership Academy at Urban Youth Impact, only 14% of those kids were reading on grade level! That is around 17 kids out of 120 that could read on the grade level that they were in! Obviously, that number was much too low. After spending 10 months at Urban Youth Impact, 73% of the same kids were able to read on grade level by the end of the school year in 2019! And 95% of the kids increased their reading abilities!

Shontriece was one of our second-grade students, who really struggled with literacy when she enrolled in Urban Youth Impact at the beginning of the school year. Even though she was in second grade, she hardly knew the letter sounds. After attending school all day, she came to Urban Youth Impact where she finished all of her school work with help from our tutors, as needed, and then spent more time focusing on literacy. She worked hard to increase her baseline STAR score from 553 in September of 2018, which is where kids beginning kindergarten should test, to a score of 727 in May of 2019! Even though she is still not reading on her grade level, she is has made so much improvement. In fact, she received out most improved literacy student award for all of her hard work! Shontriece was able to enroll in our summer camp program as well, so she was able to still focus on reading all summer and avoid the "summer slide" that many kids face after taking 9 weeks off of school in the summer. We are excited to see how much more she will be able to improve this school year as well.

Many of these children and their families lack access to visual and non-visual arts instructions, healthy meals and nutrition classes, access to mental fitness through meditation, yoga, Zumba, STEAM activities, field trips to museums Zoo, South Florida Science Museum, Kravis Center, and due your generous contribution, our children were afforded with many opportunities to take visual arts classes to include Hip Hop, Folklore, Latin dance, yoga, meditation, arts and crafts and cooking classes.

During the summer months our children spent two hours daily practicing for the Palm Beach County Spelling Bee, keep up with their math and science skills in an effort to reduce the summer slide. ### HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT: 4,282

### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

Since the funds were received, Palm Beach County 4-H has been able to purchase 6 incubators and 7 candlers for \$1689.85 and facilitated embryology programs at 6 local schools (Binks Forest Elementary, McLeod Bethune Elementary, HL Johnson Elementary, Cypress Trails Elementary, Okeeheelee Middle School, Sunset Palms Elementary, and Pleasant City Elementary School). We already have a full sign-up for embryology in 2019-2020, and will reach 2 schools a month from September 2019 through May 2020.

Palm Beach County 4-H also awarded 4 scholarships to underserved teens to attend the State Mock Legislature event, where they will develop skills to debate, analyze legislation and speak publicly, all while making new friends and learning how their government works. At this civic education event, youth can sponsor a bill, amend, or lobby it, then debate the issues on the Capitol house and senate floors in the actual Capitol building in Tallahassee.





Palm Beach County 4-H also awarded 9 scholarships to underserved youth to attend a summer residential camp, Florida 4-H Camping uses a learn-by-doing approach to help youth gain the knowledge and skills they need to be responsible, productive citizens. 4-H camps create safe and inclusive environments, involve caring adults, and utilize the expertise and resources of UF/IFAS. Campers will learn about the environment, healthy living, independence, and generosity during their time at camp. In addition, teens attending camp will also gain leadership and communication skills as camp counselors. In total, \$4109.00 in scholarship funds have been awarded. Both events will take place in June with photos to follow in the second report.

Funds were also used to purchase a blender bike. This bike will be used throughout Palm Beach County 4-H Healthy Living activities and 4-H Camps. The blender bike was purchased for \$2,413.93. The remaining \$1785.66 was used to purchase archery equipment for our urban archery clubs, including new bows, arrows, quivers, wrist guards, nocks, and targets.

- 10,147 visitors have enjoyed the Children's Museum- a place where children and families can explore their world and spend quality time together.
- 533 children have participated in S.T.E.A.M activities
- 353 children participated in story time.
- 478 children have visited the Museum during field trip days

Ava is a 4 year old girl who visits the Museum frequently. She loves the different exhibits and her favorite is the Vet Clinic. **HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT:** We anticipate **40** young adults with intellectual/developmental disabilities to participate in the program. Currently, 15 young adults have enrolled to participate in supported employment and job coaching.

### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

Aaron, a 22 year old young man with developmental disabilities, has begun his first of three rounds of pre-employment internships to expand his skill sets which will allow him to build his resume and increase the possibility of competitive and integrated employment in a career setting which matches his interests. Aaron previously had challenges with transportation to and from work but through a travel training program offered by the diversity employment counselor, Aaron is now able to successfully utilize public and private transportation options so that he can arrive in a timely manner. These skills will not only ensure that he can retain employment but opens up new opportunities for him to be meaningfully engaged in the community activities that will foster increased independence and social recreational opportunities.

**HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT:** Child Rescue Coalition is a nonprofit organization that rescues children from sexual abuse by building technology for law enforcement, free of charge, to track, arrest and prosecute child predators.

The funds received by the Great Charity Challenge were used in the first half of the year to train **35** members of Palm Beach County law enforcement on our Child Protection System (CPS) Technology. CPS Technology is a state-of-art suite of tools, that identifies, monitors, and ranks the online criminal behavior of child predators. A complete picture of predatory behavior is showcased, targeting the offenders at greatest risk of presently abusing children.





It costs \$200 for the ongoing support of one law enforcement officer for a year. With 35 trained law enforcement in Palm Beach County, this grant will allow them to continue their work of protecting children from sexual abuse. We are not just providing these members of law enforcement with leading-edge technology free of charge; more importantly, our technology will prevent **21,000** PBC children from experiencing horrific sexual abuse.

### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

- In March 2019, CPS Technology was used to identify and apprehend a gymnastics coach who was working at Twisters Gymnastics in Boca Raton. This predator was in possession of child sexual abuse material and had access to the children of our community. This shows that traditional background checks are not enough, predators search for positions of trust, they can be your teachers, your pediatricians or your gymnastics coaches. It is conceivable that this arrest prevented many children in South Florida from being sexually abused.
- In July 2019, The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office, using CPS Technology, arrested 56-year-old Timothy Scott on 15 counts of possession of obscene material depicting child sexual conduct. Scott worked as a facilities manager for the Els for Autism Foundation where he oversaw the facilities of an entire campus where there are two public charter schools, one of which is the Renaissance Learning Center in Jupiter. The investigation began when the South Florida Internet Crimes Against Children noticed downloaded files of child pornography from an IP address in Jupiter. Investigators used a search warrant to search Scott's office and computer. PBSO Forensic investigators did an on-scene preview of Scott's computer and found files "indicative of child pornography."

HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT: Student ACES taught Mental Health First Aid to **30** student athletes at Glades Central High School. Curriculum books and lunch was provided.

### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

Student ACES taught 30 Glades Central High School ACE students Mental Health First Aid training through a groundbreaking eight-hour course. This course, taught by Student ACES Executive Director Krissy Webb, gave the students the tools to identify someone who might be struggling with a mental health or substance use problem, and how to connect them with appropriate support and resources when necessary. The foundation has partnered with Student ACES to reach their goals to increase awareness of mental health resources and eliminate the stigma of mental illness. Just as CPR helps even those without clinical training assist an individual having a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid prepares participants to interact with a person experiencing a mental health crisis. Training participants learn a five-step action plan that guides them through the process of reaching out and offering appropriate support. Over the course of the year, Student ACES plans to teach Mental

Health First Aid to more than 75 high school seniors, who are student athletes. These athletes will be well equipped to identify a mental health crisis on their teams, place of work and in college. Mental Health First Aid training comes at a crucial time. While one in five Americans has a mental





illness, many are reluctant to seek help or might not know where to turn for care. Unlike physical conditions, symptoms of mental health and substance use problems can be difficult to detect. For friends and family members, it can be hard to know when and how to step in. As a result, those in need of mental health services often do not get them until it is too late. In just 10 years, Mental Health First Aid has become a full-blown movement in the United States. More than 1 million people are certified in Mental Health First Aid, and that number is growing every day.

Mental Health First Aid is part of the overall curriculum Student ACES offers high school student athletes to ensure they develop into young men and women of character, honor and integrity, and will be outstanding future employees.

In our 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter (April-June 2019), the Glades Initiative has engaged in 10 outreach events that reached more than 571 residents (possible duplication) to educate them about both our services and other services in the community for which they may be eligible. Our activities have involved the distribution and coordination of food and cold storage, assisting clients with access to benefits, organized trainings (such as medical interpreter trainings, financial literacy in Spanish, overcoming the fear of public speaking, etc.).

Eleven years after her husband first arrived in the U.S. from Haiti, she was finally reunited with him and their daughter in Belle Glade to live the American Dream. But it was not to be.

Stephanie's husband was blinded in a work accident. Their daughter also developed a mental disability. Now Stephanie supports the family, working brutal 15-hour days picking oranges, planting sugar cane and packing corn.

At The Glades Initiative, we connect Stephanie with food, information, healthcare and other services. A decent life with her family is all she wants. We're doing all we can to make that possible.

All funds were used in the first quarter. In the month of March 2019, Nonprofits First offered 8 nonprofit management classes. The classes provide professional development and training to nonprofit staff and volunteers so they can further their impact at their organizations. The classes offered in March were: Grant Writing Support; Strategic Planning, Performance Monitoring, & Risk Management; Mastering Data Overload with Excel – Auto-Filters and Pivot Tables; Belle Glade Education Project - Conflict Management; Change Leadership 101 - 6 CEUs; Engaging Staff to Elevate Culture - 3 CEUs; Belle Glade Education Project - Worklife Balance - 2.5 CEUs; Nonprofit Financial Management Network - March Roundtable.

During our summer program this year we took a group of 39 youth from our Cabana Colony location to The Kennedy Space Center.

Being the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary year of the moon landing we all thought it would be a great experience for our attendees to learn more about the history of the Space program and its strong connections to South Florida.



Many of these children were not born during this event so were

amazed to find out it all happened in their backyard! Our youth were so impressed with the Space Shuttle exhibit and spent many hours exploring Atlantis and the space station.

We also used part of our grant to enroll 25 students into the IXL learning program which is used in conjunction with our after school tutoring and homework assistance. This program will enable us assist the children in Math, Language Arts, Science and Social Studies in accordance with the current school curriculum.

### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

The Education Foundation of Palm Beach County utilized these funds to support "Ozobots Gone Wild", a GoTeach! Classroom Grant program at Timber Trace Elementary School. This program connected literacy and technology while increasing students' reading proficiency and supported students learning to work cooperatively in teams, and independently, how to code. Ozobots provided students the opportunity to learn new technology which enhanced their self-esteem and increased their desire to attend school.



During one lesson, students had the opportunity "act out" a fairytale using Ozobot as the main character. Part of the story required programming the Ozobot to complete a task or engage in a behavior related to the story. Students were challenged to make the program complex so that their Ozobot could move slow and fast and demonstrate fear, happiness, and curiosity using color and movement. The intricacy of thought that is required when coding a robot is made more complex when that robot's mission is to bring a story to life, and students were able to do just that!

Media Specialist, Shannon Culp shared that, "There was a noticeable difference in behavior in anticipation of using the new technology. Students excitement levels were visibly noticeable and therefore transferred to their ability to retell the fairy tale including numerous details. The second graders had a blast sharing the similarities and difference between their fractured fairy tale and the original ones. I asked a few students if I could keep their paper, no one wanted to allow me this courtesy. They were all so proud and wanted to take them home and share."

Ms. Culp also wanted to share, "that while many fifth-grade students were away on the Safety Patrol Trip to Washington, D.C. I was asked to supervise a group of student who did not attend the trip. These students LOVED it and were feeling very special to be the only 5th graders to get to use them this year. I would also like to mention the fabulous ability to incorporate the use of our Interactive Flat Panels… the use of the interactive whiteboard was perfect for demonstrating for the students and well as sharing student examples on youtube."



As a community based, 100% volunteer charity organization, the Wellington Colts rely on grants and sponsorships to cover the significant costs required for youth athletic participation in remote-based competition. Annually, fundraising on the order of ~\$20,000 is required to cover the cost of registration and travel for our 12 and under team to play with other players nationally in upstate NY, in the once-in-alifetime experience Cooperstown Dreams Park.

5 registration scholarships were designated for award in the next registration period, to occur November, 2019. Each participating upper class team received fund allocations adding to \$250 per to cover field and safety equipment costs (offsetting registration expenses).

#### FUNDS RECEIVED: \$2,000

HOW MANY LIVES DID YOU ASSIST WITH THIS GRANT: As mentioned in our last update, this grant directly assisted 1 (one) player, Nickolas Peguero (see photo, player #97) with a scholarship for the 2019 season (waiving \$265 in registration fees). As the GCC grant funds were received after our season had begun, our board determined that most of the funds should go towards recruitment and other initiatives for the 2020 season. Towards this end, we purchased several starter lacrosse sticks and other smaller protective equipment (goggles, mouthguards, etc, totaling ~\$250) in May 2019 to help run at least two new player clinics rescheduled from summer 2019 to October & November 2019. These free clinics were rescheduled in order to boost participation; we were able to link up with the Village of Wellington's introductory lacrosse skills program (which starts September 12), and will be soliciting families who have signed up for that, in addition to area public and private elementary & middle schools.

Our goal as a Board continues to be building this recreational lacrosse program from the ground-up, especially by recruiting more new players into the youngest age divisions. After feedback from families in the program, and discussions with other area lacrosse programs, we determined the best way to do this is to offer significantly reduced registration for our newest and youngest age divisions (U6 & possibly U8 for girls – as currently the youngest team we have been able to fill is U10). While we intended to provide equipment in way of first sticks and other protective gear to these new players, there were several reasons to choose reduced registration instead. For the 15-30 new U6 players we hope to bring into our program, this reduced registration will come at a league expense of ~ \$100-150/player (depending on number of players recruited, games played with other leagues, etc.), so somewhere between \$1,500 - \$4,500 of an investment, part of which will come



from our GCC grant funds. We will continue to take in lightly-used, donated equipment for these new players to use, and will purchase some of our own for players to use at our upcoming clinics (~\$500-\$1000 worth).

### HOW WERE THE FUNDS RECEIVED UTILIZED?

This is a repeat from our last submission. After our upcoming clinics and the registration for the 2020 season, we should be able to have more details on those assisted by the reduced registration costs for our youngest age divisions. From the 2019 season:
